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

Parts of a Flower



Flower Dissection | Lesson 3

Supply List:

- 1. Various types of flowers (from your yard or grocery store will do)
- 2. Scissors or knife (ask an adult for help)
- **Step 1:** Lay out the flowers neatly on the table in front of you.
- **Step 2:** Identify the stamen and pistil of each flower.
- **Step 3:** With the help of an adult, cut the flower in half and identify the ovule.

Note: If you don't have flowers accessible, pull out some books about flowers and name the parts in the pictures.

Older students: Identify all of the parts of the flowers as labeled on the Parts of the Flower diagram.

Note: This lesson may take two days to complete. Keep the lesson to less than 20 minutes.

Step 1: Read a short selection about violets.

Step 2: In your Nature Journal, write a narration from your reading. Consider the following questions: There are many poems and stories about violets. Do you have a favorite? Add that to the page where you drew your violet. How many varieties of violets have you learned about growing nearby? Where are the seed pods of the violet located? How are the seeds arranged? Is there anything else about the violet that you want to add?

Note: This lesson may take two days to complete. Keep the lesson to less than 20 minutes.

Dull November brings the blast; Then the leaves are whirling fast.


Chill December brings the sleet, Blazing fire, and Christmas treat.
